Reporting on: Mission Alaska

The MATA Flight Team

Flying to Alaska is as challenging as flying in Alaska. For the MATA flight team, comprised of Dary Finck and students Amanda Grimwood and Jonathan Robbins, this was the case as they departed August 2nd from Arlington, WA with smoke-filled skies. Weather closed in around the team more than once as they flew the coastal route up to Alaska. They stopped at Ketchikan, Sitka, and Yakutat along the way, arriving at Kako Retreat Center three days later.

Landing at Kako, the team helped the camp prepare for the upcoming women’s Berry-Picking Retreat in various ways. They washed dishes, cleaned homes to include eradicating bed bugs and removing bird nests from their exterior, and performed needed repairs to buildings. Flights soon departed from Kako as the women attending the retreat needed to be flown-in from villages as far

away as the Bering Sea. The retreat for these Native women would truly be a “retreat” from the sleepless nights and continual fear of abuse coming from their own homes. Kako was a respite for them and a time to pick berries for the winter season and hear the Gospel - *the message of hope in Jesus Christ.*

Our 6-seat Cessna flew many miles across barren tundra and in bad weather carrying both people and supplies. This Alaska mission trip served not only as a training ground for Amanda and Jonathan, exposing them to real mission work, but also as a ministry trip to serve those working on the ground to advance the Gospel in rural Alaska. The team landed back in Arlington on August 19th under clear skies, ready for some rest.

So without ground transportation, their own home, or a ministry agenda, John and Margaret (plus their dog, Kobe) returned to their former place of ministry where they served from 2012-14. **“Why are you back?” asked the villager. “We are here just to love you all,” replied Margaret.** And over the course of 3 weeks, the Lewises did just that, bringing the Gospel in word and deed to the hurting, lonely, and spiritually hungry. One local man actually sought them out, needing to find confirmation and encouragement for his recently placed faith in Christ. Making a difference begins by humbly reflecting the light of Christ to all, and the Lewises, by God’s grace, did just that in their return to Marshall, Alaska.

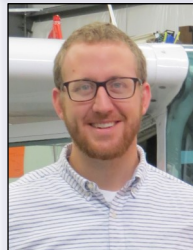
